BIRD CALENDAR - MARCH, 1907

The fall and winter of 1906 - 1907 was mild and open with the exception of storms in October and December, when snow covered the ground for about two weeks. Many migratory birds stayed late, and the winter residents were commonly seen. Skunk Cabbage was in blossom about Feb. 12 and gathered February 19, while in 1906 this plant was in bloom January 20 (the earliest record). Judged by the migratory birds, the present season is about a week late.

The following resident birds were seen during the winter:

Crow (Cleveland Heights - all winter) rookery in neighbor-

hood, Downy Woodpecker (Jan'y 1), Hairy Woodpecker (Jan'y 19)

Chicadee (Jan'y.), Blue Jay (Jan'y), Hawk, probably Cooper's,

Wade Park. (Feb'y 5).

A robin was heard on December 8, 1906, at Cleveland Heights, Noble Road, and a single Robin was seen on December 11.

A flock of about 20 Canada Geese were seen on December 23, 1906, flying north over the Y.M.C.A. building in Cleveland by W. J. Watterson.
