As if to balance a remarkably wild April, May was exceptionally wet and cold, frosts that caused sad injury to fruits, occurring on May 18, 19, and 27, here or in adjacent sections. It was a hard month for nesting birds, many eggs and young having been destroyed that might otherwise have been successfully reared.

A male Ruby Throated Hummingbird, that spent the night of May 26 in the vines on the Biological Laboratory, was caught in a butterfly net and set at liberty in the building. Though partially benumbed by the cold, it soon revived, and many had the rare opportunity of studying the habits at close range, for it showed no fear. It hummed constantly at the window-pane, like a moth attracted by the light, but occasionally came to rest on the curtain-cord; it never failed, however, to go to flowers that were offered it, and would come to a spray of Weigelia held in the hand, probing every flower repeatedly for honey, which was procured by protruding its long and exceedingly delicate tongue. The rate of vibration of the wings was roughly estimated at sixty times a second, but this was not accurately tested, and the weight of the bird was exactly twenty-four grains.
