Bulletin No.1 - March 1917

The past season has been favorable upon the whole to Bird-Life: an exceptionally mild autumn with no severe frosts until the middle of November was followed by a winter of about the average intensity; severe blizzards were infrequent; the ground was seldom long covered with heavy snows, and fruit buds, up to the present are uninjured. Winter resident birds, nevertheless, appear to have been less abundant than for many years, and rarely have so few winter visitors been reported. Deficient observation may account for the apparent lack of resident birds, but the absence of winter visitants clearly points to an abundant food supply farther north.

Early migratory birds must be hard-pressed for food to eat the berries of the stag horn or smooth sumac, but on March 16, Professor Hulme counted ten bluebirds and four robins on a single bush of this plant.
