April and May were cold months, and the past four weeks have seen an inordinate amount of rain; vegetation has been restarted, and some fruits, especially peaches, have suffered more than was earlier anticipated. Apple blossoms are from 10-14 days later than usual. Warblers have been correspondingly late in arriving, the first considerable wave having reached Cleveland Heights on May 17, or one week behind schedule time, but have been abundant since that date to the present, - May 28.
