December and January, 1917 – 1918, proved highly unfavorable for most of our winter resident birds owing to deep snows which lay for a long period and covered most of their available food. Very few species were noted up to February 10, when those conditions were broken. Notwithstanding repeated and rather prolonged periods, ranging from 12 to 15 degrees below zero, at Cleveland Heights, peach buds, contrary to precedent and expectation, have not been killed, and the fruit buds of other trees are now in prime condition. Since February 10 comparatively mild weather has prevailed and the season has been ideal for all migratory birds. Recorded dates of arrival, however, show but little change from those of last year, which proved exceedingly fatal to bird-life, especially to young in the nest, owing to protracted cold storms, and consequent interruption of [or] retardation of the food supply. This catastrophe, which overtook most of the smaller migratory species, extended over a wide belt of about 1,000 miles from the Atlantic to the Middle West.
