## BIRD CALENDAR, 1931 – 27th Year

Bulletin No. 4 - September 22, 1931

This number of the bird calendar is a little delayed since it was desirous to make it as complete as possible for the summer season. Records obtained during the three months of June, July, and August are here included, and so this report is principally that of the nesting activities of birds in this region.

The number of contributors this time is small, because many people were absent on vacations or were busy at other activities. However, the nesting season is one of the most interesting during the year in spite of heat and mosquitoes. The contributors are John Aldrich, James Stevenson, Francis Gilliland, J. Paul Visscher, W.H. Waterson and S. Charles Kendeigh.

This fall, we hope more people will send in records of birds seen during the fall migration. We know, already, that many people are active. A fall calendar will probably be issued some time in December which will cover the months of September, October, and November. The usual committee will receive records or they may be sent direct to Dr. S.D. Kendeigh, Department of Biology, Western Reserve University.

One hundred twenty-two species are recorded in this number. Of these seven species had not been reported previously. The yearly list of birds seen and recorded so far this year by the Cleveland Bird Club now stands at two hundred sixteen. For a large number of the records included in this number we need especially to thank Mr. John Aldrich.

There are certain kinds of censuses of nesting birds which any person can take either on the grounds around his home or elsewhere. One of these is a count of the actual number of nests of all species of birds present. It is usually necessary, in order to get all of them, to make a systematic search three, four, or more times during the summer through every shrub and tree. As an illustration and as a record for 1931, the following nest census obtained on the 15 acres bird sanctuary at the Baldwin Bird Research Laboratory, is here given. The species are listed in order of abundance.

It would be interesting to see if other people can equal this and furthermore, a record of the birds nesting on your private estate is always worthwhile. This census is remarkable in that there is no record of mourning doves nesting, although in previous years they have been common. We wonder how that compares with the experience of others.

Included in the following list, are the records of several species which it is especially worthwhile to note. Among these are the Wood Duck, Egret, Wilson Snipe, Caspian Tern, Henslow Sparrow, Junco, Purple Finch, Prothonotary Warbler, Short-billed Marsh Wren, Red-breasted Nuthatch, and Veery. One will also notice that the fall migration is well under way with the return of the sandpipers and the early warblers.
