A Flight for Life: Midwest Monarchs **Presented by Cheryl Harner**

Ohio's most recognizable butterfly, the Monarch (Danaus plexippus) is in dramatic decline. The migration of the Midwestern Monarch is now considered an "Endangered Biological Phenomenon." In 1998 renowned lepidopterist Lincoln Brower first pro-



jected monarch populations would be decimated within this dec-

The Monarch's wintering sites in Mexico receive careful annual review and their population is measured by the size of the wintering butterflies' communal roosts. In 2014 the winter population was the lowest ever recorded. Many factors contribute to the demise of the Monarch population which migrates through the Midwestern United States.

The conservation effort for Monarchs is complicated by international borders and economic considerations. Scientists and citizens alike are exploring strategies to increase milkweed acreage, reduce the use of pesticides and herbicides and to encourage private property owners and state agencies to provide Monarch habitat. The extirpation of Ohio's reigning butterfly, the insect best suited for fostering scientific curiosity, would be a significant loss to our children's life experience. The Monarchs' impact is far greater than their four inch wingspan suggests.

Cheryl Harner is interested in all forms of flora and fauna and fascinated by the connections between botany and wildlife. She is an avid gardener and life-long wildflower and butterfly enthusiast. She currently serves two land trust boards and frequently speaks as an environmental educator and advocate for conservation and land preservation. Her extensive volunteer work includes long-time leadership in Ohio Ornithological Society, Greater Mohican Audubon Society and Richland County Master Gardeners. The Co-founder of Flora-Quest, a botanical ecotourism adventure, also writes a native plant, bird and butterfly blog for its website: Weedpicker's Journal (www.cherylharner.blogspot.com).

Conneaut Sandspit Sunday August 30, 2015 at 8:30am

Description: The Sandspit at Conneaut often attracts an array of exciting shorebirds including

Sanderlings, Red Knots, Willets, Semi-palmated Sandpipers, Pectoral Sandpipers, Dunlin, and occasionally something even rarer. Location: 480 Lake Rd, Conneaut, OH 44030 is the address of the park overlooking the public beach. From the park, you can drive west and take a left along a road which will go down towards the marsh, then take another left, and then drive towards the beach. Take a right and follow the sandy road to the end of the sand spit.

Introducing the New President Dave Dvorak

I am a naturalist, writer and photographer. My first love has always been nature, beginning when I was old enough to walk. As a child I spent most of my time exploring the natural world and when older, began working to preserve it. While I was still a young child I wrote letters to the government urging the President and Congress not to dam the Colorado River in the Grand Canyon. Much more recent conservation work has been to save endangered ecosystems like the tall grass prairie and Florida everglades. I retired in June 2012, after thirty four years as a naturalist with the Cleveland Metroparks. Prior to that I directed an outdoor education program and was a science teacher for the East Cleveland Schools. As a naturalist I have led tours for the Cleveland Metroparks Institute of the Great Outdoors and for the Clipper Cruise Line. I've traveled from the Arctic to the Caribbean and have numerous slide shows that I present to the public. In recent years I've added historical shows on Henry David Thoreau, Aldo Leopold, the Santa Fe and Oregon Trails, and I'm currently working on a Lewis and Clark program.



I am also President of the Ohio Prairie Association (OPA). You can visit the website at www.ohioprairie.org. OPA's mission is to protect native prairies and wherever possible restore and reconstruct Ohio prairies on lands that were probably prairie. Ohio was at one time the home of the Greater Prairie Chicken, but it was extirpated from the state because of loss of habitat and over hunting. Some birds like the Bobolink and Eastern Meadowlark are discovering Ohio prairie again.

As KBC President I would like to continue to find, with the help of club members, interesting speakers on various topics concerning birds. Also I would like to work with local Audubon Societies on field trips and larger scale programming. Your ideas are welcome.

EDITOR'S NOTE: Dave's photographs have appeared in and on the cover of many publications including magazines, books, posters, etc. Selected periodical credits include Sierra, Birder's World, Bird Watchers Digest, Audubon, Stackpole Books, Lerner Publications, Far Country Press/Montana Magazine, Fine Gardening, and the New York Times. Dave has written and illustrated a children's book for the Macmillan Company, A SEA OF GRASS: THE TALLGRASS PRAIRIE. Dave has had articles published in many periodicals including Bird Watchers Digest, Birds and Blooms, Birder's World, WildBird, Emerald Necklace Newsletter, and Kansas Magazine. His research articles on tallgrass prairies have appeared in scientific journals.




Introducing the New Field Trip Coordinator Lukas Padegimas

I'm sure most of you have met me as I have just finished my final term as President of the Kirtland Bird Club. I love birding and have a passion for conservation.

Although I will begin my second year of law school next year, my heart has always lain where adventure beaconed. Upon finishing high school four years ago, I found ample opportunity to explore a few little parts of the world. Instead of attending my high school graduation, I joined a FWS field camp in the Alaskan Arctic to study nesting shorebirds. Field Trip Reports

Field Trip Report - April 25, 2015



On a cloudy morning with NNE winds, seven hardy folks met Lukas Padegimas for the April 25th KBC field trip at Cleveland Lakefront Preserve. We tallied forty-eight species in two and a half hours as the group worked its way clockwise on the Perimeter Loop Trail.

We spotted six Common Loons and seven Horned Grebes in the marina basin and beyond the breakwater in Lake Erie. An estimated raft of four to five hundred Ruddy Ducks were tucked into the near shore area on the leeward side of the preserve. There were four woodpecker species: a male Red-bellied, three female Yellow-bellied Sapsuckers, four Downys and two Northern Flickers. Tree and Barn Swallows coursed overhead. A single Blackthroated Green Warbler was a welcome sight, as well as were two male Yellow-rumped Warblers. Group members spotted triads of Brown Thrasher, Eastern Towhee, Swamp and White-throated Sparrows, as well as nineteen Song Sparrows. American Gold-finches added dashes of color to the sightings.

The morning walk's most exciting mammal sighting was a Mink that popped up on the northern bulkhead of the preserve. It stayed long enough for everyone to get good looks but not long enough to be photographed.
